### ABOUT THE COURSE

#### EN 421

#### JOURNALISTIC ENGLISH

#### 1. COURSE OUTLINE

This course focuses on the format of newspapers with an emphasis on the use of English in various sections such as the headline, lead and body including different types of news stories and specialized vocabulary and terminology.

#### 2. COURSE OBJECTIVES

This book aims to equip students with journalistic knowledge and the main elements of news stories and provide them with practice and exercises to improve their journalistic writing competence. The course also focuses on using newspapers to acquire information and increase general knowledge so that students are able to achieve both better writing and reading ability.

#### 3. COURSE EVALUATION

A final examination of 100 marks will test the students' writing ability. There are about 5 subjective questions testing students' knowledge, understanding and use of the verbs in the headlines, their writing ability

for leads and being able to put the information in the form of a news body as well as being capable of using the appropriate vocabulary for each type of news stories. A 'G' grade is between 80 - 100 marks, a 'P' grade is 60 - 79 and an 'F' grade is 59 - 0.
